# Gifts to benefit our community

Two generous gifts to the library will mean lasting benefits for the entire community. A brand new local history space at Ritter has been made possible by a donation from Nancy and Ken Bliss to the library's new foundation.

A bequest from the estate of Adele Kovanic has also been made to the foundation, whose mission is to ensure the library will continue as a vital community resource into the future.

The Blisses, who are local residents, are regular supporters of the library. Zack Dolyk, president of the Ritter Public Library Foundation, said their gift will fund the local history area, which will be located on the second floor. It will include computer stations for patrons working on personal projects, a book scanner, microfilm reader and other research resources.

The library's local history collection has been moved to the new space, and staff will be available there to help people use library services for their research.

Kovanic, who died in 2018, was a longtime teacher in Vermilion area schools. She also served for 75 years as organist at St. Mary Church in Vermilion.

### **Donations at work**

New self-check-out stations at the customer service desk were paid for with funds generously donated by customers in honor and memory of loved ones over the years.

About a third of all check-outs at Ritter are done by customers themselves, freeing up staff to help with other transactions. The previous self-check stations were about ten years old and were past their warranted life.

Ritter's endowment fund was established in 1999 and is managed by a board of volunteers. In the past ten years, the funds have paid for furniture in the second-floor reading area and in the teen department, refurbishing the early learning room, outdoor patio furniture and a new microfilm reader.

### Focusing on teens

Teens can find a place of their own at their library. Every Wednesday after school, kids in grades 6 to 12 get together at 3:30 p.m. for games, crafts and more.

## You count! Ritter is here to help

2020 is a census year! Every ten years, according to the U.S. Constitution, every citizen must be counted. This will be the first year the census may be completed online. Ritter staff will be trained and ready to help people make sure they are counted.

The census determines representation in Congress and the Electoral College. It is also used to draw districts for

federal, state and county offices.

The federal government uses data from the census to decide how to spend billions of dollars. Census results are also used by researchers, businesses and other groups including libraries.

In April, every household will receive a postcard with instructions for how to respond. Anyone who needs help can contact the library.

# Parent center to open this spring

Parents of children with special needs will find valuable information plus training and the chance to network with others at a new resource center set to open this spring in the children's department at Ritter.

The center is being funded by a grant from the Ohio Department of Education won by Melissa Wagner, career and transition specialist at Vermilion High School, and Karen Blackburn, director of pupil services.

They are working with Bethany Schmitkons, head of Ritter's youth services department, and Director Joy Walk on a plan for furniture, bookshelves, a bulletin board and materials, as well as programs, training and more.

"We wanted to have the center at the library so that it will be available in the evenings and on weekends too," Wagner said. "The materials - books, magazines and flyers - will be available for people to check out through the library."

She said parents will have a place to get together and learn about assistance available through the school, county and state for students with disabilities. Plans also include a book club that school personnel will kick off, with the goal of moving to parent-directed book studies in the future.

### **Computer classes are back**

Basic, hands-on computer classes are back. Get familiar with the computer so you can use programs such as online job applications and Microsoft Office.
